Dear Parents / Fellow Members

But this year it's an easy question for me to answers. At the end of May Cubs and Scouts spent a long weekend at Phasels Wood Scout Camp. During the first day it rain all afternoon, continuing in to the evening. Our camp site was turned to mud and everyone was soaked through. On to business, the group's membership increased slightly during the year. At the census (completed in January) the group membership stood at 45 however has fallen since to approximately 38members.

This year has seen a turn around mainly due to the groups fund raising activities and Jean's help with keeping expenses under control!

The group has also been very lucky and has been donated a new trailer, by Visonic, worth £1,400. The Groups existing trailer was very worn out and becoming dangerous, we are all very grateful for the donation as it will serve the Group well for years to come. However, we can not be complacent and the Group needs to keep fund raising in order to ensure we can run activities, purchase equipment as well as pay for all the boring things like rent and insurance.

By this time most of you will be aware that the 29<sup>th</sup> June will be our last night at Holmbase before moving to Christ the Sower School. We will be sad to leave as the hall has served us well over the last year and we are very thankful to Linda (Caretaker) and the Holmbase committee for their continued support. However, during the Autumn and Winter months space is at a premium especially if we have 15 Scouts or 18 Beavers running around playing games. We also need a regular new intake of Beavers, Cubs and Scouts together with leaders if the group is going to survive for year to come.

Leaders and helpers are particularly important, and one of my objectives over the coming year is to try and get more people involve so we do not rely on the same names over and over again. I know I sound like a worn out record but without Adult helpers and leaders there is a really possibility some sections will not be able to meet, and worst still the group will close. This may sound dramatic but unfortunately it is reality.

Finally, I am sure you will join with me in saying a big thank you to the section leaders, Chris (SL), Mick (ASL), Tricia (CL), Rob (ASL & ACL), Stuart (BL), Alison who helps out at Cubs, and all the other helpers who have worked very hard over the last year to run their sections. My thanks to the committee, especially Julie and Jean who keep me in check, and Mark for all his help in looking after the group's equipment. Additionally my thanks to our outgoing Chairman Richard Whitting.

We greatly appreciate all their efforts and thank them for their continued support over the coming months and years.

### Treasure's review

Attached is a copy of the group's accounts for the year 2005/2006. The accounts have been viewed and agreed by the Groups current Chairman, Richard Whiting and are currently with



Keens Shay Keens Chartered Accountants for audit. Once audited, a copy will be sent to the District Treasurer to be held on file for the Group.

What a great year the Group has had! Just by looking at the total cash in bank/hand on the front cover as at 31 March 2006 in comparison to last year shows how healthy the bank balance is! We have practically doubled the amount we had at last year end, but still managed to subsidise many of the years events along the way – particularly the Christmas Party at the Snozone that the Group contributed 50% toward the cost.

I'll give you a few headlines as to why we've managed to grow the finances so successfully this year:

- Subs are being paid and collected promptly and your continued support with this is appreciated. Subs continue to be our main income and we need to ensure we are collecting subs efficiently at the start of each term to ensure our cash flow remains consistent.
- Several, but not all of our activities, generated a small profit for the Group which has helped to swell funds. In addition to this, the Group conducted more fund raising events last year which helped raise funds to either subsidise events or purchase new equipment. The bag packing and various raffles always do well and the now annual Car Treasure Hunt continues to grow!
- We were also lucky enough to receive a 'matched fund raising donation' from Abbey Charitable Trust of £519.56! If any of you work for companies who run similar schemes – ask them if they would be prepared to help the Group either in a financial way or by donating raffle prizes.
- The Group were successful in obtaining a Wider Use Grant from the council towards the cost of renting Holmbase the grant was equivalent to 70% of the annual rental.
- Capitation costs were higher than last year, but this is a 'knock on' effect of having more children in the Group, which in itself generates more income, so we have to live with that!

Whilst we've had a great year and spent some large sums on camp events, trips and kit, overall, spending has remained under control for the Group and is carefully monitored.

The new financial year looks bright and in the black! As at 31 May 06, the Reserve A/c (savings account) had a balance of £689.87, the Main A/c £1852.67, so the overall net funds were £2542.54.

The Group have achieved a tremendous turnaround from this time last year in respect of finances and we need to keep the momentum going to ensure we can continue to run camps, trips and other fun activities for the children.

Thank you for all your support over the last year and I look forward to this continuing over the next financial year!
